Keith Farmer by Kathern Spence Kelley

Many of you may have seen the recent World Retriever Championship (WRC) aired on the Outdoor Living Network. What you might not know is that the eighth place finisher was a club member by the name of Keith Farmer. I recently talked with Keith and asked him about how he got involved in retriever training, the World Retriever Championship and what advice he might give to amateur trainers.

For those that do not know him, Keith Farmer was born and raised in Waycross, Georgia. He still resides there with his wife and children and is actively involved in running a family owned business. Keith originally got involved with dog training through

bird dog trials but found himself interested in retriever training. After following through on a commitment to successfully campaign his own dogs to the field trial level, Keith became a professional, retriever trainer about five years ago. He currently trains twelve advanced and two young dogs. These dogs' accomplishments include Master Hunter titles, Master National qualifications, several Derby level placements and Qualified All Age wins.

The dog that placed in the most recent WRC is Jet. She is a two year old black Lab with back to back Qualified All Age wins. And while that fact might give you a

hint of why Jet was able to place so high in a field of one hundred dogs consisting of Qualified All Age and Master Hunter dogs, it doesn't explain how Keith Farmer was able to train such a competitive dog.

Hoping to get a glimpse into Keith's training technique; I asked him "What advice would you give someone who was just starting out training for retriever tests?" Mr. Farmer had two pieces of advice. The first piece of advice was to get involved. As Keith explained, studying the game (i.e. going to hunts and/or field trials) and learning the rules should be a first step for every-

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Jeannie's Corn Bread

- 1 Heaping cup Ballard's Cornbread Mix Or corn meal
- 1 Small carton sour cream
- 1 small can (8 1/4 oz.) cream style corn
- 2 eggs
- 1/8 tsp Salt
- 1 stick butter



Melt butter in 8x8 baking pan. Mix other ingredients in bowl. Pour over melted butter. Bake 350° for 35 minutes or until sides pull away from pan. (At the Andy Attar seminar I doubled this and used a can of cream and whole kernel corn.)

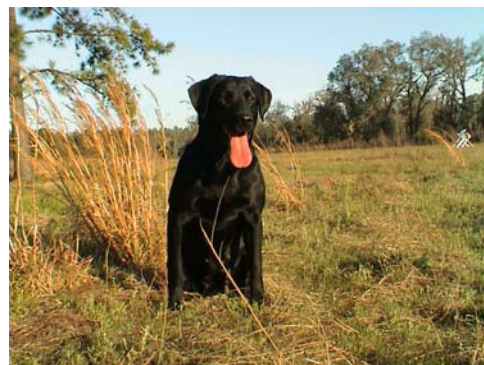
one.

His second piece of advice was to train for a higher level than you intend to run your dog, be it hunt test or field trial. As Keith explained, before entering even a Junior Hunt Test (JH) it would be wise to go beyond the basic (i.e. marking) and work on line manners and handling. As he put it, your confidence level is higher and the game is more enjoyable when you are well prepared.

long this line of thought, the process of preparing for competition is something on which handlers should also be focused. To successfully compete, a dog needs to be in the best physical shape. A diet of high quality dog food and exercise is essential to combat the stress of travel and temperature extremes to which competition dogs are subjected.

And just as you can not ignore the basic physical needs of your dog, Keith added that you should not overlook the basic principles in training. Too often, handlers want to advance their dogs and get hooked on the big concept (e.g. multiple marks) while failing to insure that the dogs are covered on the linchpin principles of training such as line manners. A handler who fails to recognize that you need to constantly address the basics is not only building on shaky ground but also probably does not see his role in the unnecessary problems created. Such a handler then is more inclined to correct a dog for honest mistakes which leads to more mistakes and an over correction cycle begin.

Keith and I also talked about corrections. When to correct; when not to correct; and how to correct were just some of the topics Keith covered with me. Hopefully space permitting in a future issue of this newsletter I'll be able to more fully go into his philosophy. But



in a nutshell, I think Keith Farmer best summarized his philosophy in the following sentence. "It is all about reading the dog and maintaining attitude."
